# **Utilities and Community Facilities**

# **Major Findings**

- ☐ The City of Sheboygan Falls provides a full range of services and utilities to its residents.
- ☐ The condition of streets and utilities has been upgraded over the years, and they are considered adequate.
- ☐ Some trails exist through parkland.
- ☐ The City has a grant to study and locate appropriate locations for bicycle and pedestrian trails.
- ☐ City residents are within a short distance of quality medical services and other higher educational opportunities.

#### Recommendation

☐ In conjunction with the trail location study, the City should conduct a Community Facilities Needs Assessment that would justify an impact fee to assist in the cost of constructing trails or developing new parks.

### **Goal and Objectives**

#### Goal

□ To provide utilities and community facilities in the most economical and efficient way possible while maintaining a high quality of life for residents and the profitable operation of businesses.

#### **Objectives**

- 1. **Sewer and Water Service:** Continue the City's contractual relationship with the City of Sheboygan that provides wholesale public water and sewage treatment service.
- 2. **Efficient public services:** Provide utilities and community facilities and services in a manner that will promote efficient and orderly growth, and make Sheboygan Falls a more attractive community in which to live, work, recreate, and visit.
- 3. River Access: Create new ways to access the Sheboygan River.
- 4. Trail Development: Take full advantage of a 2.7 million dollar grant to fund and address gaps in bike/pedestrian trails, encouragement of non-motorized transportation, and safe passage of students to their schools.
- 5. Park Development: Work with organizations to develop more parkland in the city.
- 6. **Expansion of Rochester Park:** Once site remediation has been completed, the City should negotiate with the owner of the Tecumseh property to add land to Rochester Park and construct a trail and pedestrian bridge to avoid the heavy traffic in the downtown area and the Monroe Street Bridge.

- 7. **Snow Removal:** Prioritize snow removal on critical roadways prior to morning peak traffic periods.
- 8. **North Side Utility Extension:** Capitalize on the extension of public water and sewer lines by encouraging growth on the city's northwest side.
- 9. **Fire Department Services:** If sufficient volunteers become an issue, look at consolidation with adjoining volunteer fire departments.
- 10. Sidewalks: The City Council needs to develop and implement a city-wide sidewalk policy.
- 11. **Wind Turbines:** Amend the Subdivision Ordinance to require minimum standards for the location of Wind Energy Systems.
